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1. School Vision, Mission and Motto

Founded in 2006, HKFYG Lee Shau Kee College (HLC) aims to nurture and encourage all our students, challenging them to be the best they can be, in and outside the classroom. We are committed to the pursuit of academic and intellectual achievement, the development of physical prowess and the building up of moral character and conscientiousness. Passion for learning, knowledge and the broadening of horizons will be the hallmarks of an education in HLC. The school motto, "Wisdom in Action (智慧之源 ・求實求真)" guides students towards a greater inquisitiveness and curiosity, not just with regard to their studies, but also towards life and the world around them.

2. Our School

2.1 Basic Information

We are a Direct Subsidy Scheme (DSS) school not participating in Secondary School Places Allocation (SSPA).

Medium of Instruction:

The school aims to help students to become trilinqual and biliterate in order to meet the needs of society. All subjects except Chinese Language, Chinese Literature, Chinese History and Liberal Studies were mainly taught in English. A Bridging course in summer is offered to all Pre-S1 students to help them adapt to the use of English in school.

Class structure:

The school operated 6 levels (secondary 1 to secondary 6), each with a maximum of 5 classes. The class size on average was below 30. In School Year 2013-14 we opened up to 29 classes with a total of 653 students (as at 31 August 2014).

School Facilities:

Apart from 30 standard classrooms, the Assembly Hall, Science laboratories and special rooms, there are 2 covered playgrounds, 2 basketball courts, a Student Activity Centre, a Media Centre, a Language Room, 2 Computer Rooms, a School Library, a Meeting Room for Parent-teacher Association, a room for Learning through Engineering, Art and Design (LEAD) Project, 3 rooms for small groups learning, a fitness centre and a tuck shop.

School Fees (as at 31 August 2014):

\$19,200 per annum for S.1-S.3, and \$28,800 per annum for S.4-S.5 payable in 10 monthly installments and for S.6, payable in 7 installments. We offer scholarships to students who attain high academic results and have good conduct; and fee remission to those in need.

4.3 Reflections on Actions taken in Addressing Major Concern: To enhance teachers' professional growth and build a unifying community

A wide range of training including internal and external courses, lesson observation, sharing in staff meetings, team teaching and co-planning, school visits and interflows were arranged. Teachers were receptive to new initiatives and were willing to adopt innovative teaching strategies. A sharing culture has been built up among them. The Subject Coordinators and Teachers-in-charge of functional groups had performed their leading roles satisfactorily. In view of the comparatively young teaching force, continuous efforts should be made in enhancing teaching quality and classroom management. In general, teachers worked harmoniously and the culture of mutual respect has been cultivated. Due attention should be paid to their physical health.

5.2 Academic Initiatives

Streaming System

The Pre-S1 Attainment Test and the summative assessments of the school year served as the basis for identifying students' capability from which junior students were streamed into different sets in core subjects, i.e., Chinese, English and Mathematics. Such streaming system offered incentives to students and enhanced effectiveness of teaching and learning.

• Teacher-student Mentorship

Early identification of students with various learning needs in all levels facilitated teachers' remedial work. The centralized teacher-student mentorship programme was in place allowing teacher mentors to help their mentees to set goals and timetable for progress throughout a period

of time. Evidence showed that student mentees showed greater motivation in learning. Those who demonstrated positive learning attitude and improved performance could exit the programme whenever appropriate.

• Enhancement and Remediation

The Extended Programme (EP) provided challenging tasks for high achievers and remedial sessions for students who needed extra support in both Chinese and English. The English EP was characterized by the culturally-enriching activities co-run by the expatriate tutors and the Native English-speaking teachers. The Chinese EP focused on enhancing students' creative writing. While the high achievers were more motivated and benefited more from the programme, improvement in academic achievement was also evident among the weaker groups. The talent pool maintained by the Gifted Education Team had also helped teachers to identify and stretch students' multiple intelligence. This year we had nominated 81 students to attend 65 training sessions of different nature offered by The Hong Kong Academy for Gifted Education, The Chinese University of Hong Kong, The Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups and The University of Hong Kong. 50 students participated the International Competitions and Assessments for Schools. The majority of teachers had completed the Foundation Course in Gifted Education offered by The Hong Kong Academy for Gifted Education so as to develop knowledge and skills in teaching gifted students.

• Learning through Information Technology

The School had joined the "WiFi as a Service School Partnership Project" with AiTLE and HKedCity. Free Wi-Fi network was installed in 5 classrooms on 1/F. Subjects in the Humanities Key Learning Area pioneered in exploring mobile learning with iPads. Teaching plans were drafted and resources collected.

Self-directed Learning Award Scheme in Junior Forms

The Scheme encouraged students to (1) read, (2) form "Mutual Support Study Group", and (3) visit Language Room. Students who took initiative to complete the tasks would be awarded. This year, a total of 101 learning attitude marks were given out because of this Scheme. In addition, the online programmes and reading schemes conducted by different subject departments inculcated in students the culture and habit of self-regulated learning. Thanks to the generous contribution from donors, the students could enjoy a wider collection of reading materials in the School Library.

5.3 Academic Achievements

5.3.1 Internal Tests and Examinations

In general students demonstrated a pleasing learning attitude. Most of them worked hard for tests and examinations. This year, a total of 32 scholarships and 542 academic awards were offered to students who performed exceptionally well.

5.4 Reflections on Actions taken in Addressing Major Concern:

To raise students' academic performance by meeting individual needs and cultivating self-directed learning attitude

- The knowledge and skills learnt about catering for differences have been sustained and applied in all subjects. In the teacher survey, about 60% of teachers agreed that students' individual needs were met. As the difference among students was still evident, further training on identifying students' learning needs and corresponding teaching strategies will be provided.
- Analyses of school and public examination and test results were regularly performed to diagnose students' abilities so that the school could formulate measures to bring about desirable learning outcomes. Subject teachers will be required to devise corresponding strategies targeted at students' weaknesses.
- Students' self-directed learning attitude is yet to be enhanced. Some teachers also need more encouragement and preparation to make use of eClass platform and other IT resources so that learning can take place more flexibly. More efforts will be put in varying the design of assignments and raising students' awareness of expectations and requirements of subjects.
- To boost performance in DSE, it is suggested that tutorial groups be arranged for students dropping elective subjects in S6. A re-visit to the NSS curriculum is necessary. Academic Affairs Committee and Subject Departments will further explore a list of strategies for this.

6. Student Development and Support

6.1 Discipline and Guidance (D&G)

To further enhance the awareness of harmony at school, the D&G Sub-committee held the 'Anti-bullying Campaign' with a series of activities such as game booths, board display competition and sharing in morning assembly. "Caring Stars Scheme" and "Mentoring Service to primary schools" were in place to help students to know their blessings and develop empathy for those in need.

The School Social Worker (SSW) helped much in dealing students' emotional

and special educational needs. Referrals were made when necessary. Talks and workshops on stress management, problem-solving skills, anti-drug messages were also offered. The data from APASO showed improvement in students' confidence in their achievement.

6.2 Careers Guidance (CG)

A 6-year framework of careers education was in place to equip students with the requisite qualities and skills to explore options and opportunities for further education and careers in different fields.

S1-2 students took part in Careers Mapping Workshop organized by The Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups. School-based workshops were offered to S3 students. Through activity-based programmes, students were more aware of how their personality can affect their career path. Their self-exploration also helped them to make more realistic subject choices.

S4-6 students were offered a wide choice of programmes such as Job Shadowing, Workplace Visits organized by MTR, Disneyland and The Hong Kong Federation of Youth Groups. Alumnae were also invited to be guest speakers on subject choice in tertiary education. "How to face DSE and Stress Management" and "Guidance on JUPAS" were programmes that won very positive responses. Information about overseas study was also offered to students. The most popular destination this year was the United Kingdom.

6.3 Moral and Civic Education (MCE)

To achieve the outcomes of the Major Concern, "Students Care for Self, Others and the Environment", the Environmental Conservation Thematic Week had successfully raised awareness in three aspects, namely, energy saving, food wastage and waste classification. The school gave full support to one S4 student in his application to join the Yan Oi Tong Green Adventure to Kenya. His sharing after the trip had inspired the importance of green lifestyle in his fellow students. Various activities such as "Bring Your Own Bottle Day", "All I Can Eat" and "Energy Saving Talk" also brought home useful tips and ideas of leading a greener and healthier lifestyle.

6.4 Other Learning Experiences (OLE)

The OLE Sub-committee coordinated the 42 extra-curricular activities to expand students' aesthetic and physical development. Promotion was carried out in early September. The annual Life-wide Learning Week for all students and the newly introduced 'Technology Day' equipped students with practical life skills. Students were coached to become leaders and ambassadors of school to unleash their potentials. The first Students' Union offered services to fellow students such as stationery sales and lunch box ordering. The Union also channeled students' opinion about school policies. Students were also encouraged to learn beyond the classroom. Two study tours aiming at language learning and broadening students' exposure were arranged. This

year the destinations were New Zealand and Korea.

6.5 Students with Special Educational Needs (SEN)

The SEN Team had set up a mechanism to identify students with special learning needs. 5 sessions of school-based training strategies and practical skills were offered to teachers. The 'Buddy Scheme' and 'Pull-out Programme' were in place to build up students' confidence and form proper study habits. Closely working with Academic Affairs Committee and parents, the SEN Team had enhanced students' examination performance and emotional control.

6.6 Reflections on Actions taken in Addressing Major Concern: To develop students' life skills and self-efficacy

The school adopted a whole-school approach to attain the intended outcomes of Major Concern II: that students care for themselves, others and the environment; and that students have grown in self-confidence. According to surveys, students in general had positive comments on the support provided. They appreciated teachers for listening to them, helping them to do their best and treating them fairly. We also saw students grow in maturity in organizing activities and voicing opinions. Students with special needs were also adequately taken care of. Continuous efforts will be made in strengthening students' physical and mental health to meet challenges and adversities.

7. Parent-school Cooperation

7.1 New S.1 Parents' Day

The meeting with new S1 parents in July provided knowledge of the intellectual, cultural and social climate of HLC. Besides the school mission and vision, parents were provided with useful information, such as the school's language policy, disciplinary concerns, student activities arrangements and channels of home-school communication.

7.2 Meeting all parents

As early as in October, there were Parents' Nights for the school and parents to exchange views on the learning outcomes of students. Subsequent meetings were held to meet parents of a particular level to offer tips on study skills or choice of NSS electives.

7.3 Home-school communication

In the second term of the school year, the school started to issue "paper-less" parents' circulars through eClass Parent App. With the instant home-school communication, parents could enjoy the free flow of school

information and therefore reinforce the home-school relationship. Despite a few technical hiccups, parents in general welcomed the use of such technology. More efforts should be put in reaching out the 'inactive' parents.

7.4 The Parent-teacher Association

The Annual General Meeting cum the 6th Standing Committee election was held on 8th November 2013. Ms Christine Yip was elected to be the Chairman. She and Ms Carman So were nominated as SMC parent representatives and their tenure expired in June 2014. Ms Christine Yip and Ms Jennifer Li were elected to take up the position. Five general PTA Standing Committee (PTASC) meetings were held in order to keep up the communication with the School. Discussion on the adjustment of Besides, a talk on "Positive Parenting" school fee was included as well. by Dr Tsang Fan Kwong and a workshop on "Positive Psychology" by Mr Poon Chun Kau were organized for parents and students in February and March 2014. Teachers, parents and students enjoyed their visit to Sha Tau Kok village and a food waste recycling centre in April 2014. PTA received very encouraging response from parents and teachers. This year, 75 parent-volunteers participated in different school events such as library stock taking, Open House Day, Foundation Day and Sports Day. The PTASC worked closely with the Student Welfare Team so as to monitor the quality of the service providers.

9. Future Planning
